FAMILY & COMMUNITY SUPPORT SERVICES (FCSS)

YOUTH PROGRAMMING

BABYSITTING COURSE

In 2022, Nampa/Northern Sunrise County Community Services coordinated a babysitting course in Nampa for youth between the ages of 11-15. The Canadian Red Cross Babysitting course covers everything from managing difficult behaviours to essential content on leadership and professional conduct as a babysitter. Babysitting deepens and enhances the responsibility that older youth feel when caring for younger children.

HOME ALONE

In 2022, the Community Development Coordinator from Nampa took training to become a Home Alone instructor. As a result, we were able to coordinate two Home Alone workshops for youth ages 9-11 in Nampa and St. Isidore. Home Alone prepares children to be on their own at home for short periods of time.

KIDS EXPLORERS

Kids Explorers aims to connect youth in the community of Cadotte Lake after school. The program is geared towards school aged children. Participants enjoy a variety of crafts, games, activities, team building initiatives and receive light snacks and refreshments.

KIDZ KONNECTION

Kidz Konnection aims to connect youth after school in the community of Nampa. The program is geared towards school aged children. The youth participate in a variety of themed crafts, games, activities, team building initiatives and receive light snacks and refreshments.

PARENTING PROGRAMS

In 2022 we offered parent and tot based programs in Nampa (Little Adventurers), Cadotte Lake (Little Tots), and St. Isidore (La Petite Ecole). These programs allow parents to learn how to play with their child and how to enhance early developmental skills. Parents and their children were able to explore different themes each month (Candyland, Artic Animals, Tropical Escape, Cupid Cuties, Shake your Shamrocks, You're so Bunny, Gone Buggy, Farm Frenzy, Bubble Busters, Ice Cream Crazy, Ahoy Matey, Lights Camera Action, Looney Tunes, and Tinsel Toes).

TEDDY BEAR PICNIC

Community Services partnered with the Peace Region Family Resource Network for their 7th Annual Teddy Bear Picnic on June 9, 2022. The event is designed for children ages 0-6, their parents/guardians, and their favourite stuffed friend. Participants explore interactive booths and engage in activities with their stuffed friends, while parents are able to gather parenting resources to help support the healthy growth of their child.

TEEN SCENE

In 2022, a Teen Scene program was established to reconnect the teens in the community of Nampa. The teens came together with a local artist to make macramé hangers. The program was coordinated over two days. The program was made possible in partnership with Blooming Blossoms by Rachel.





FAMILY & COMMUNITY SUPPORT SERVICES (FCSS)

YOUTH PROGRAMMING

TINY CHEFS

The Tiny Chefs program was introduced in the community of Cadotte Lake in 2021 as a virtual program. The goal of the program is to encourage families to come together with their children to cook a healthy meal. In 2022, the Tiny Chefs program was offered in person at the Mamowintowin Hall. Participants received all of the necessary ingredients and supplies required to make a themed dish each month.

YOUTH SUMMER CAMPS

In 2022, Nampa Community Services coordinated two summer camps for children ages 6-9. Funky Monkeys was coordinated in July. Participants enjoyed three days of exploring the Peace Region (Murphy's Flats, Peace River Splash Park, Kimiwan Bird Walk, High Prairie Swimming Pool, and Historic Dunvegan).

Fun in the Sun was coordinated in August. Participants enjoyed three days of exploring the Peace Region (EastLink Centre in Grande Prairie, Queen Elizabeth Park, Grimshaw Outdoor Swimming Pool, Down to Earth Petting Zoo near TeePee Creek).

COMMUNITY PROGRAMMING

ADULT LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES

In 2022, Nampa/Northern Sunrise County Community Services partnered with a variety of local and regional organizations to offer free adult learning opportunities. Presentations made available included, Pre-Planning (Wills & Estates, Funeral Planning), Canada Revenue Agency Webinars (Digital Services, Benefits & Credits), and Grief & Loss. The goal of the adult learning opportunities is to link individuals to local resources, increase their knowledge around mental health and engage participants in conversations.

BUDDY UP CAMPAIGN

In 2022, Nampa/Northern Sunrise County registered for and coordinated the Buddy Up Campaign, during the month of June. Buddy Up is a men's suicide prevention communications campaign; a call to action to men, by men. For the month of June, posts specific to suicide, men's health, and having open, honest conversations with men, were shared on the County and Community Services social media pages. In addition to promoting the campaign, FCSS partnered with Nampa Bumper to Bumper to offer a Let's CollaBREWate event where men could gather resources relating to men's health and enjoy free coffee and donuts. FCSS was also invited to the St. Isidore Coop Customer Appreciation Day to share the Buddy Up resources.

CHRISTMAS GIFT CARD PROGRAM

Each December, Nampa/Northern Sunrise County Community Services receives donations from local organizations and individuals to purchase Christmas Gift Cards for those in need. Since 2014, gift cards have been purchased from local grocery stores and delivered to people in need through the mail in a Christmas card. The program is 100% anonymous. Community members are encouraged to refer those in need to the Community Services Department so that they are included on the Christmas Gift Card program list. In 2022, there were 71 families and individuals that received a gift card and Christmas card in the mail courtesy of donations received from Northern Sunrise County, Elbow River Marketing, Village of Nampa, the Proud Family, Blue Star Thrift Store, Marie Reine Cultural Society, Nampa Gospel Women's Ministry, and a variety of anonymous donors.

COMMUNITY HEALTH & WELLNESS FAIR

Community Services partnered with Woodland Cree Health, Lubicon Lake Health and KTC, to host a Community Health and Wellness Fair on May 10, 2022. Participants were able to visit information booths set up by local and regional service providers, gather resources to gain knowledge for a healthier lifestyle and participate in health screenings. Participants were also treated to a free BBQ and were able to put their name into door prizes.

COMMUNITY PROGRAMMING

COMMUNITY PANTRY PROGRAM

Nampa/Northern Sunrise County Community Services has food shelves at their local office spaces to assist with collecting and dispersing non-perishable goods to individuals and families in need. The Community Pantry Program aims to assist individuals experiencing financial hardships and food insecurity.

DANCE FAMILIAL

St. Isidore Community Services partnered with the St. Isidore Cultural Society to host a free family dance at the Bar Bar. Families were able to connect while enjoying snacks and a coordinated dance.

DERBY DASH

In 2022, Nampa Community Services coordinated a kub car race for parents and their little mechanics. Families registered to receive a kub car kit which had to be designed and decorated prior to a community race, during the Annual Farmers Day event. A new track was purchased with grant funding. The track can accommodate four cars at a time and has a built in timer. Families took turns racing their custom cars for a chance to win.

FAMILY DAY CELEBRATION

A Family Day celebration is held annually in Nampa. Nampa Community Services coordinated a Family Day Celebration at the Nampa & District Complex. Participants were able to skate for free, roast hot dogs over an open fire, snowshoe, play in the snow piles, and connect with other families in the region.

FAMILY SCAVENGER HUNT

To get the families active in the County and the Village of Nampa, a Family Scavenger Hunt was created and made available from June 6 - 11, 2022. The scavenger hunt encouraged families to visit every community in the County and in the Village of Nampa, and to explore what they have to offer. There were opportunities to find landmarks, community members, and complete simple objectives that benefit the community, such as donating non-perishables to the Community Pantry Program and donating food to the local animal shelter.

FAM JAM PAINT NIGHT

Cadotte Lake Community Services partnered with Woodland Cree First Nation and KTC Health to offer free virtual paint nights, which included engaging conversations about common mental health concerns, such as anxiety, depression, suicide, etc. Registered participants received the art supplies required and a Zoom link to join the paint instructor. While painting, participants were provided resources on mental health and were given the opportunity to share their lived experience and their current struggles.

FARMERS FOR FARMERS

Community Services coordinated free coffee and sweet treats for the farming community at Farmers Restaurant on March 25, 2022. The goal was to show appreciation to our farmers and to wish them well in the 2022 farming season.

COMMUNITY PROGRAMMING

FROSTY FAMILY FUN DAY

In January 2022, St. Isidore Community Services partnered with St. Isidore Cultural Centre to host the annual Frosty Family Fun Day at the St. Isidore Skating Rink. Participants were able to skate, toboggan, enjoy roasting marshmallows over an open fire, and cups of hot cocoa. This event encourages families to get active together during the cooler months. It was held in partnership with the St. Isidore/Three Creeks Fire Fighter Association and Alberta Health Services Health Promotions.

JUST IN CASE

The Just in Case program was launched in January 2022. The program assists residents with preparing the documents and information they will need in case they or a family member have a sudden death or emergency. The form holds no documents; instead, it lists where to find your important documents. Supplies and instruction provided free of charge. The forms were made available in paper and digital formats.

MARCHE FAMILIAL

In 2022, St. Isidore Community Services partnered with the St. Isidore Cultural Centre to host the annual Marche Familial (Family Run). Families are encouraged to walk, run, or push strollers along the pathways in St. Isidore. After the walk, participants are treated to hot dogs and light refreshments.

STORYWALK®

StoryWalk® is an innovative and delightful way for children and adults to enjoy reading and the outdoors at the same time. Community Services coordinated five StoryWalk® events at Cecil Thompson Park. There were five different books, along with themed activities posted at the park for a week, for families to interact with. May (Be Brave, Little Penguin by Giles Andreae), June (Always Everly by Nate Wragg), July (The Color Monster by Anna Llenas), August (Attitude of Gratitude by Amy May) and in September (When We Were Alone by David A. Robertson).

In August, we featured a book illustrated and written by local author, Amy May. Amy May joined participants at the Cecil Thompson Park on August 18 for an afternoon of interactive activities and made herself available to sign books.

In September, as the book was directly linked to Residential School systems, the book was also featured at the National Day of Truth and Reconciliation event hosted at Riverfront Park.

SUICIDE PREVENTION

In 2022, Nampa/Northern Sunrise County Community Services partnered with Aspenroad Resources and the Centre for Suicide Prevention to host a variety of Suicide Prevention workshops:

ASIST

Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training (ASIST) is a two-day interactive workshop in suicide first aid. ASIST teaches participants to recognize when someone may have thoughts of suicide and work with them to create a plan that will support their immediate safety. The workshop was held in Cadotte Lake on January 12 - 13, 2022.

How to Talk About Suicide Virtual Workshop

How to Talk About Suicide: a conversation guide, is a virtual, 1.5-2 hour synchronous small group training opportunity. This webinar explores common myths and facts around suicide, who is impacted and why, as well as steps to begin a conversation about suicide. The workshop was coordinated on February 10, 2022.

River of Life

River of Life is an interactive half-day workshop created for adults working with Indigenous young people aged 12 and up. This interactive workshop discusses strategies to strengthen the protective factors of young people considering suicide and focuses on providing participants with knowledge to competently respond. The workshop was held in Cadotte Lake on October 20, 2022.

COMMUNITY PROGRAMMING

VOLUNTEER APPRECIATION

Residents of Northern Sunrise County and the Village of Nampa are encouraged to nominate local volunteers in their communities. The Awards recognize County residents for their volunteer efforts and how they have contributed to the well-being of their community and fellow community members.

To celebrate the volunteers within the County and Village, Community Services coordinated a Volunteer Appreciation BBQ at the St. Isidore Fire Hall during Volunteer Week in April. Volunteers were formally recognized, enjoyed a traditional BBQ, and were able to put their names in for a variety of door prizes.


VOLUNTEER INCOME TAX PROGRAM

The Volunteer Income Tax Program is for low income seniors (55 and older), persons with disabilities, and individuals with modest income.

In 2022, Nampa/Northern Sunrise County Community Services applied to host income tax preparation clinics for the Community Volunteer Income Tax Program with Canada Revenue Agency. The clinic ran from March 7—April 29, 2022 and it assisted 51 residents with completing their 2021 tax returns.

WOMENS SELF DEFENSE

Community Services partnered with the Sagitawa Friendship Society and the Peace River Regional Women's Shelter to host two Women Self Defense classes for Indigenous youth and women. Female, Indigenous students were able to participate in an afternoon Women's Self Defense class at the Peace River High School Gymnasium and adult Indigenous women participated in an evening class at the Sugar Plum Daycare Gymnasium on November 3, 2022. The participants learnt how to get out of holds and how to get away safely during sexual assault/domestic violence scenarios, how to kick and punch properly in order to defend themselves, how to remain calm and stay logical during sexual assault/domestic violence situations, how to handle bullying in a safe manner(emotionally and physically) and promoted inspiration and self awareness through motivational speech from a person with lived experience.





FAMILY & COMMUNITY SUPPORT SERVICES (FCSS)

SENIOR PROGRAMMING

HOME SUPPORT PROGRAM

The Home Support program was established to assist families and individuals, seeking to create an environment conducive to the clients needs. The service is designed to promote well-being in our region by providing assistance in the household; enabling ill, disabled, or frail individuals to remain in their own homes and to age in place.

In 2022, the Home Support Program had two casual Home Support Coordinators and eight clients.

MYSTERY TRIP

The Mystery Trip returned in 2022. Seniors put their trust in our staff and boarded the van not knowing where they would end up. The seniors enjoyed an outing to the Dixonville Water Ski Club, where they were treated to a BBQ, boat rides, and acoustic music by the fire.

OLDER ADULT WELLNESS KITS

Older Adult Wellness Kits were made available for Northern Sunrise County and Village of Nampa residents, ages 55 and older. Kits include a selection of local and regional resources, senior benefit information, self care items and promotional material intended to foster meaningful connection to your community and to celebrate the aging process. Kits will be made available by request moving forward.

SENIORS' COFFEE MORNING

Seniors' Coffee Mornings were held in Nampa at the Farmers Restaurant and at the Cafe du Coin in St. Isidore. The coffee program allows seniors to connect with other seniors while enjoying a free cup of coffee or tea.

SENIORS HEALTH & WELLNESS FAIR

Community Services partnered with the Town of Peace River FCSS to host a Senior's Health & Wellness Fair on November 9, 2022. Participants were able to visit information booths, gather resources, connect with other seniors in the region and listen to two guest speakers. They also enjoyed a free luncheon and were able to put their names in for several door prizes.

SENIORS' WEEK EVENTS

Nampa/Northern Sunrise County strives to celebrate their seniors each year by hosting and attending Seniors' Week events throughout the Peace Region.

Cadotte Lake hosted a Seniors' Week Brunch at the Mamowintowin Hall. Seniors came together for a traditional brunch.

Nampa hosted a Seniors' Week Pancake Breakfast at the Nampa Golden Pioneers Seniors Drop-in Centre, where seniors were able to put their names in for draws, gather resources, and enjoy each others company while eating a homemade pancake breakfast.

WHEELS TO MEALS

The Wheels to Meals program provides nutritious meals and promotes health, well-being, and independence for individuals. The program was offered every Monday, excluding stat holidays, until September, when the program was moved to Wednesdays. The Wheels to Meals program was offered as a delivery program in 2022. In 2022, the program was offered 38 times, and it served 35 residents (average 25 people each week).


In 2022, there were 225 FCSS programs offered within Northern Sunrise County and the Village of Nampa with a total of 60 individual programs.

RECREATION & CULTURE PROGRAMS

YOUTH PROGRAMMING

BIKE RODEOS

In 2022, Nampa/Northern Sunrise County Community Services coordinated three Bike Rodeos. Bike Rodeos were held in Cadotte Lake, Nampa, and St. Isidore and were hosted in partnership with the local RCMP, as well as the local Fire Departments. Bike Rodeos allow youth to learn valuable bike safety tips and gain confidence while riding in their communities.

CRAFT WORKSHOPS

In 2022, Nampa/Northern Sunrise County Community Services coordinated several crafting opportunities for children and youth. Craft workshops allow children and youth to come together with their peers to learn a new hobby and skill set. Supplies, instructions and light refreshments were provided to the participants. Workshops provided in 2022 were a Valentine's theme craft day, Arts & Crafts Buddies summer program, Art of Pyrography, and skull string art.

END OF THE SUMMER PIZZA PARTY

In 2022, St. Isidore Community Services hosted an End of the Summer pizza party at the St. Isidore Cultural Centre. Pre-teens and teens were invited to build their own pizza from scratch with their peers the Friday before school started.

HIGH FITNESS

St. Isidore Community Services partnered with a local fitness instructor to coordinate a youth inspired High Fitness Class. Participants were able to participate in a free, hour long fitness class geared towards youth. The goal of the program was to increase physical activity intake and to connect youth with their peers.

INDOOR/OUTDOOR HOCKEY PROGRAM

Indoor/Outdoor Hockey was offered in Cadotte Lake. When weather permits, the youth utilize the outdoor rink to play ball hockey and/or ice hockey. When the weather does not permit, indoor hockey is offered in the gymnasium at the Mamowintowin Hall. Hockey nights allow youth of all ages to be active in a controlled environment. The rules of the game are taught and everyone has an opportunity to play (all ages and abilities welcome).

NERF WARS

St. Isidore Community Services coordinated a nerf war event at the St. Isidore Cultural Centre on September 29 for youth ages 9-15 years.

YOUTH PROGRAMMING

OPEN GYM NIGHT - YOUTH NIGHT

Cadotte Lake Community Services hosts the Open Gym Nights two times per week at the Mamowintowin Hall in Cadotte Lake for youth ages 12-17 years of age. The youth participate in a variety of interactive activities while connecting with their peers after school.

SCOOPS N' SCORES

In 2022, a Scoops n' Scores event was held at the Marie Reine Sports Court. The youth in attendance participated in a variety of basketball challenges, drills and games before enjoying homemade ice cream sundaes.

SPLISH N' SPLASH

A water fun day was held in August for youth ages 8-15 in Marie Reine at the Cultural Centre. Participants were able to participate in a variety of water themed activities, including water balloon volleyball, water balloon basketball, plunger races, toss the water balloon, etc. In addition to the water activities, the Nampa Fire Fighter Association brought their fire engine and coordinated a large scale water fight.

YOUTH SOFTBALL

During the summer months, St. Isidore Community Services coordinated youth softball evenings at the St. Isidore ball diamond once a week for youth ages 9-16 years. Participants were encouraged to bring their gloves for an evening of softball. Depending on how many participants arrived each week, the youth would either split into two teams and play a game or they would participate in mini softball drills.

COMMUNITY PROGRAMMING

ADULT DESTINATION COOKING CLASS

The Adult Destination Cooking program was introduced in the community of Cadotte Lake in 2021. The goal of the program is to give individuals confidence in the kitchen and to learn how to cook unique and a healthy meal options. Participants received all of the necessary ingredients and supplies required to make a themed dish each month.

CHRISTMAS LIGHT UP

St. Isidore Community Services partnered with the St. Isidore Cultural Centre and the St. Isidore/Three Creeks Firefighter Association to host the 2nd Annual Noel Community Christmas Light Up. Participants gather to witness the community trees being lit for the holidays. They are able to connect with other residents while enjoying hot chocolate, hot dogs, and Christmas music.

COMMUNITY SKATE

During the winter months, Cadotte Lake Community Services hosts community skate nights at the outdoor rink at the Mamowintowin Hall. Participants are able to connect with other community members while enjoying an evening of skating, shinny hockey, wiener roasts and light refreshments.

COMMUNITY WORKSHOPS

Nampa/Northern Sunrise County Community Services coordinated a variety of workshops throughout the year to encourage residents to connect with their communities and to socialize with others, all while learning a new skill or craft. Participants are able to take home their completed craft at the end of the program. In 2021, Community Services hosted a door mat workshop, paper flower workshops, Aerial Fitness class at Lift Fitness, traditional beading workshop, appetizer workshop, sunflowers on glass panes, Christmas hanging basket workshop, and a wreath building workshop.

COMMUNITY PROGRAMMING

FAMILY DODGE BALL

In 2022, St. Isidore Community Services and Nampa Community Services coordinated family dodge ball evenings at the St. Isidore Cultural Centre Gymnasium and the Nampa Public School Gymnasium. The goal was to get families active with one another and within their community.

FARMERS DAY

Nampa/Northern Sunrise County Community Services coordinates the Annual Farmers Day event in June. The event is run in conjunction with the Farmers Day Baseball Tournament. In 2022, the event included inflatables, mini games, glitter tattoos, cotton candy and slushes. There are approximately 400 people in attendance each year.

HALLOWEEN CELEBRATIONS

Halloween Celebrations were held in Cadotte Lake, Nampa, and St. Isidore in 2021.

Cadotte Lake Community Services hosted a family craft night where participants created miniature haunted houses using bird houses. There were 37 people in attendance.

Cadotte Lake hosted Trunk or Treat at the Mamowintowin Hall. The Trunk or Treat event gave residents an opportunity to decorate their car trunk or truck bed and hand out candy in the Mamowintowin Hall parking lot. There was approximately 150 people in attendance.

Nampa Community Services partnered with Farmers Restaurant and the Nampa Museum to host Scarecrow Frenzy. Registered participants received stakes and were instructed to build a unique scarecrow. Scarecrows were put on display at the Nampa Community Garden and on Halloween, they were voted on.

Nampa Community Services also hosted a Monster Mash Family Dance the weekend before Halloween. Participants enjoyed a DJ dance, spot dance challenges, and snacks. There were approximately 90 people in attendance

St. Isidore Community Services partnered with the St. Isidore Cultural Committee to host a Halloween stop by event in the Cultural Centre parking lot. Participants received goodie bags and pre-wrapped hot dogs. There were approximately 125 participants that stopped by for a treat.

JUMP & JAM

In August 2022, Community Services partnered with the Economic Development Department to host the 2nd Jump & Jam event at Cecil Thompson Park. The event featured local bands, bouncy castles, glitter tattoos, and a fresh air market. Over the course of the event, there were approximately 400 people in attendance.

REGIONAL PROGRAMMING

FRESH AIR CINEMA

In 2022, Nampa/Northern Sunrise County Community Services partnered with the Town of Peace River and Fresh Air Cinema to host summer outdoor movie experiences. There were two movie nights hosted. On July 26, the movie was held at the Peace River Agricultural Grounds and featured Sing 2. On August 26, the movie was hosted at the Peace River Misery Mountain and featured The Bad Guys. In addition to the movie, a variety of local food vendors were onsite serving fresh eats for participants. Each event attracted around 350 participants.

PADDLE THE PEACE

Paddle the Peace was first established in 2009 as an event where participants were able to paddle the mighty Peace River with lunch, transportation to the launch site, and safety sweeps provided. Paddle the Peace is the recipient of the 2014 Growing Rural Tourism Champion Award which honors outstanding accomplishments, innovation, and leadership in Rural Tourism. The event is coordinated by Northern Sunrise County, County of Northern Lights, Town of Peace River, and M.D of Peace. This year, Paddle the Peace reduced its participant numbers and split the entry into two waves in response to the pandemic. The event was held on August 20, 2022. There were approximately 100 paddlers registered for the group paddle down the Mighty Peace River. This is an annual event scheduled on the third weekend in August.



Dear Minister Copping:

At the Regular Bon Accord Council Meeting on December 6, 2022, Council received a copy of correspondence from the Town of Ponoka to the Ministry of Health requesting support for their local fire department as first responders for emergency ambulance calls. Bon Accord Town Council fully stand with Ponoka in support of their request for better delivery of ambulance services across the province.

The incidents described in the letter show that ambulance service for rural Albertans is in severe crisis. What steps are being taken to remedy this detrimental situation for our communities? As Canadians, our section 7 Charter right to life, liberty, and security of person should be top priority. The current state of our ambulance service, or lack thereof, affirms instead that these rights hang in the balance.

These incidents, and others across the province, also show the value local fire departments bring to our communities. The lack of adequate ambulance service is placing unfair stress and expectations on volunteer firefighters and further putting the health and safety of Albertans in jeopardy.

These community volunteers and our communities deserve better. We hope your Ministry will make positive changes moving forward to uplift our communities during these difficult times.

Travel Alberta Cooperative Marketing Grant:

- a. Summer Marketing Campaign Website sessions were up 51% which equals an additional 16,000 sessions (total of 49,000) and up 86% from 2 years ago. Page views were up 27% (78,000 total). Industry Leads were up 202%, year over year. This represents an additional 2400 tracked leads to partner websites and online properties. Across all platforms we generated 32,675 link clicks to the website and over 1,804,851 impressions on our ads. Our Google Grant saw a 4.41% increase in clicks.
- b. MPT's 60th Anniversary: This project where we have placed geocaches throughout our member municipalities has been very successful so far. Even though this project has just recently started and considering it's the middle of winter there has been a surprising number of participants. There have been over 78 finds already of the successfully placed Geocaches! When players find a geocache, they can scan a QR code which takes them to the MPT website to try their luck on the Lucky Wheel. There have been over 40 Mighty Peace 60th Anniversary Lucky Wheel Award winners already. Prizes available have been donated by our members, these range from rounds of golf, ski passes, discounts at businesses, drop in passes to rec centres and much more! We have received lots of interesting feedback on the Geocache website such as comments about the beautiful areas and how they intend to visit again in the summer. These geocachers are also taking lots of photos and sharing them using our hashtags creating some great organic content for MPT.
- c. Winter Marketing Campaign We are in the middle of our winter campaign. We focused on activities this year and the Mighty Geocache Hunt & Photo Contest.
- d. **Member Login and New Memberships** The membership page is up and running. Memberships can now be purchased here online. We have developed a new membership option businesses with the same owner may purchase additional memberships for only \$50. The new member login is not ready at this time and still needs more work.
- 5. ATB Account We have moved MPT's bank accounts from CIBC to ATB as ATB offers more online banking options for business and non-profit accounts. Online payments will be set up and we will begin using this process in the new year. This should streamline many of our banking activities and save on bookkeeper costs.
- TRF Grant To recap MPT has been successful in our application for this grant and will be receiving \$140,000 for a Trails Project. This is an important project that will provide a market-driven strategic plan grounded in good research, honest analysis, and effective stakeholder engagement that will be a crucial component in future trails development throughout our region. This plan will provide information on what trail potential there is in this region, where specifically is this potential, who are we targeting as users with trail experiences like these as well as what needs to be done to realize this idea. Trails are one of the most desired types of recreational infrastructure and the potential for tails to support economic growth and development through trail-based tourism is growing worldwide. The Peace region is rich with untapped potential in this area. Alana & I had initial meetings with RC Strategies as well as the AB Government rep from the Ministry of Forestry, Parks, and Tourism to kick off the Trails Project. Items on the agendas were a general overview, workplan review & engagement discussion, and data & information transfer. We are requesting data from stakeholders and have compiled contact information for all stakeholders which has been shared with RC Strategies. If you are contacted in the next couple of months by RC Strategies, we hope you'll take the opportunity to give them your feedback and any information that you can share. We have recieved the first advance of the grant



in the amount of \$42,259.00 and we have received and paid the first RC Strategies invoice for the amount of \$45,744.30. Francophone Circle Tour: A Francophone Circle Tour has been created and will be published on our website and in the February issue of the Move Up Magazine. The circle tour goes through the Town of Peace River, St. Isidore, Northern Sunrise County, McLennan, Falher, Girouxville and Marie Reine. A photoshoot by Paul Lavoie was completed for this project. This involved some local families who modeled for the photos. This was a great success and we have some amazing content that will be very useful for this project as well as many other future campaigns. Mackenzie Frontier Circle Tour: This completed Circle Tour is currently being promoted online and doing exceptionally well. For more information on the circle tour visit: https://mightypeace.com/circle-tours/the-great-northern-alberta-circle-tour/. The Brochure has been finalized and is ready for print. 9. Grande Prairie Tourism Circle Tour: We have a meeting scheduled with Grande Prairie Tourism. They are very interested in collaborating with Mighty Peace Tourism on this project. 10. Memories are Made in the Mighty Peace Newsletter – Two editions of the external newsletter were sent out in November and December. This newsletter can be received by anyone signing up for it on the MPT website. The first shared information about our 60th Anniversary Geocache event, the Ski & Stay and Dog Sledding packages available to purchase on the MPT website as well as an article about Unique Gifts available in the Mighty Peace. Advertisers were Riverside Ranch Décor. The second edition offered articles about our local craft beer producers, The Green Goddess Company and shopping local as well as the Pond Hockey event coming this spring and the Winter Do Not Miss List for the Town of McLennan. Ads were purchased by Krooked House, Whispering Pines Ski Hill, J's Java Domain and Clear Hills County. We are currently working on the next edition of the internal newsletter, MPTA Connect, this will be coming out later this month. All of our members receive this newsletter and lots of great information is included as well as minutes from the most recent board meetings. 11. ITA Conference: I attended this conference in Edmonton from December 5th to 7th. This was a great experience with lots of networking opportunities. There was an Indigenous Artisan Market and an Indigenous Experience night showcasing some very talented dancers. Re: Town of Fox Creek Ambulance Service

Dear Minister Copping,

In November 2022, the Town of Fox Creek was copied on correspondence from the Town of Ponoka expressing concerns on behalf of their Volunteer Fire Department as first responders to emergency calls. The letter received from the Town of Ponoka summed up some of the major issues in our province perfectly, and the Town of Fox Creek would like to reiterate the concerns with the state of our ambulance service in rural Alberta.

We share in our main concern being the ambulance services that we are receiving from Alberta Health Services. Recently, our community has gone without an ambulance for 14 hours because of patient transfers and staffing issues. The most troubling part of this lapse is the number of times that it seems to be happening. Because of our location, when an ambulance leaves our community, our closest backup unit is a minimum 45 minutes away. Those 45 minutes can quickly turn into over an hour if the roads are bad or if there is not a crew available immediately. Those 45 minutes could very well be the difference between life and death, or could change the course of someone's future.

Much like Ponoka, our Fire Department has been the first responders to many calls that would not necessarily fall under their mandate, however, because they love our community and the people that live here, they go without hesitation. They have seen things they should not have to see and have held the hands of individuals through extremely tough situations.

Fox Creek has also stepped up and is running our Medical First Responder Program out of our volunteer department, however, with a lack of funding for the program, many of the costs to run the program are being covered by the community. It is time the province finds a way to deal with the ambulance situation in rural Alberta that does not fall on the back of volunteer fire departments or municipalities.

It is only a matter of time before the gamble to move Fox Creek's ambulance to a busier location when AHS is short-staffed does not pay off and a life is lost because of the lack of service provided. Unfortunately for Fox Creek, when that happens, it is going to be someone in our community.
