As you may be aware, the Peace Regional Subdivision and Development Appeal Board (PRSDAB) is scheduled to hear Appeal Files No. 26PRSDAB001-A to 26PRSDAB001-E on August 12, 2026. The appeals relate to the approval of Development Permit Application No. 2026-02 for a Veterinary Services – Animal Care Facility/Shelter in the Town of Peace River.

Greetings to our Village of Nampa Councillors,

Regarding: **Formal Complaint:** Short Legal 8021462; 10; 4

I am writing this to make a formal complaint against Rock River Developments Ltd. And/ or any invested parties or owners not yet known.

This concern references Bylaw – 459, Village of Nampa, Province of Alberta. The following is noted concerning the above-mentioned unoccupied property and buildings:

- i. Signs of serious disregard for general maintenance and upkeep is detrimental to safety of our residents including structural neglect and dangerous conditions;
- ii. Safety concerns are amplifying due to the excess of derelict and unkempt state due to the serious disregard for general maintenance and upkeep; and lastly
- iii. Significant rot, deterioration, inappropriate infiltration of air, missing shingles or other roofing materials, broken or missing windows, holes and openings into the building, and growing level of water in the basement is gravely concerning.

On behalf of concerned citizens, I am requesting Council:

- 1) Utilize bylaws and enforcements provided within the MGA;
- 2) Contact and use safety services such as RMA for reference;
- 3) Request inspection from fire department;
- 4) If necessary, request inspection services through Alberta Safety Codes Authority; and
- 5) Use their Authority Having Jurisdiction to enforce compliance or make the property less of a grave safety issue.

Should the fire department and RMA take an active interest and follow-up on this matter, action can be quite swift. (Point 2 and 3 above.). Regardless of consequences, it would be advantageous for those two government servant groups to advocate alongside of yourselves.

I am interested in this being a collaboration, support, and measure to increase pressure on the ownership of Short Legal 8021462; 10; 4. The safety concern is of the utmost level. The proximity to a day care, library, recreation complex, and residential areas is mere blocks.

Although I loathe more tax dollars and efforts going into this, I do not want it on my conscience, nor anyone's, that someone be harmed or die due to the excessively unsafe property and building that we could have mitigated.

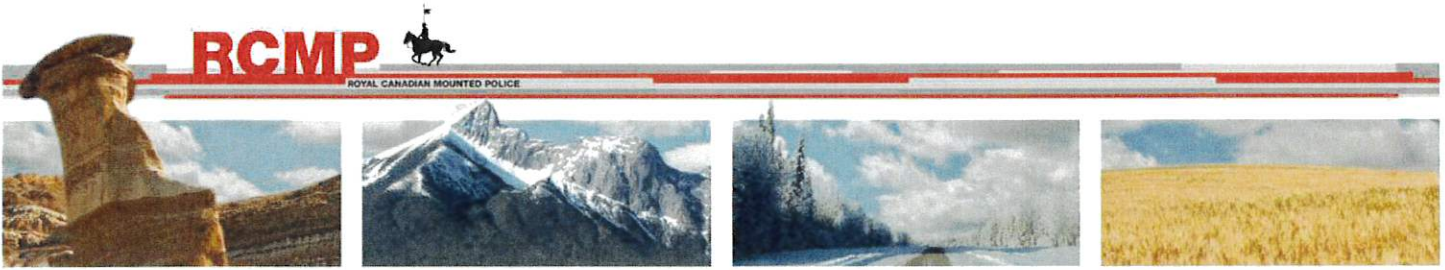

This report provides an overview of human resources, financial information, and crime statistics for the Peace River Detachment and reflects the ongoing priorities identified by the community we serve.

In addition to the information contained in the attached report, the Alberta RCMP is also advancing the rollout of the newly approved black-and-white General Duty vehicle design. This redesign is not simply cosmetic. It reflects a commitment to being a modern, professional, and approachable police service while maintaining a clear connection to the RCMP's history.

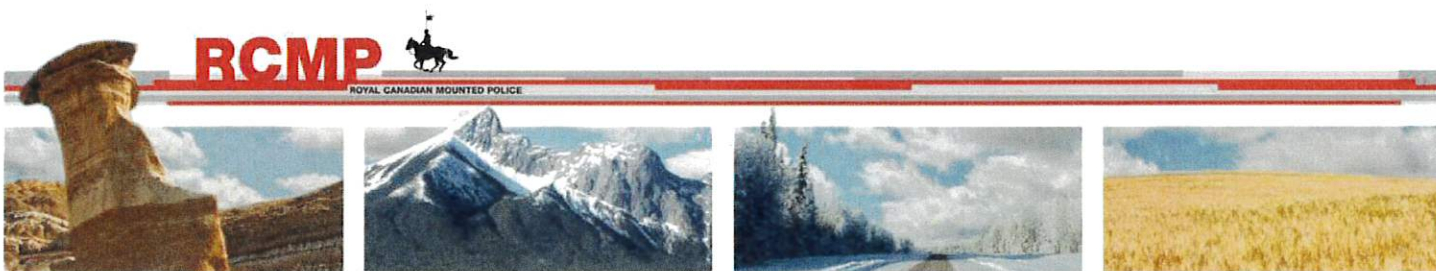
The updated look features white doors on a black base, along with high-visibility, reflective graphics to ensure the vehicles can be easily recognized in all conditions—day or night, in rural or urban settings, and across Alberta's diverse climates. This ensures RCMP vehicles are clearly identifiable as law-enforcement vehicles while remaining visually distinct as the RCMP.

Provinces, territories, and municipalities will be able to include local identifiers based on regional requirements. These variations allow for local flexibility and help demonstrate our connection with the communities we serve, while preserving a consistent, recognizable national RCMP identity.

Given the size and operational demands of the fleet, full conversion to the new design will take place gradually. Vehicles will transition to the new design as part of the natural replacement cycle, allowing older units to be retired without creating unnecessary incremental costs. This phased approach supports fleet consistency and modernization over time.

This modernization effort reflects the RCMP's ongoing commitment to ensuring members have the appropriate tools and training to serve their communities safely and effectively. Investments in equipment such as this are essential to maintaining high standards of policing and adapting to evolving operational demands.

Community Priorities

Priority #1: Organized Crime - Drug Trafficking**Updates and Comments:**

Peace River GIS team had the opportunity to attend crucial training this quarter to help build on investigational avenues for drug trafficking investigations. Source development along with surveillance courses were attended this quarter. Peace River Detachment is actively working on Criminal Code investigations related to drug trafficking and illegal possession of firearms. These types of files are complex and require judicial authorizations to enact. These investigations will continue in the coming quarter. The detachment front lines members were also provided the opportunity to attend training as it related to the handling of sources.

Priority #2: Property - Break and Enter Investigations**Updates and Comments:**

RCMP members of the Peace River Detachment have been active in break and enter investigations along with finding stolen property. Break and enter files are notoriously difficult to solve due to no witnesses or surveillance camera's. Investigations have continued which have led to proactive patrols in high targeted areas. Proactive patrols have led to stolen property recovered and returned to the rightful owner. Peace River RCMP is working with the Town and local business to encourage additional security measures along with having the Crime Prevention Coordinator position relocated from Grande Prairie to Peace River. Local GIS team is apart of the offender management program which monitor four of our local prolific offenders through partnering agencies to provide supports to help keep them from reoffending





Priority #3: Police / Community Relations - Police Visibility and Community/Youth Engagement

Updates and Comments:

The quarter detachment members have been active in community involvement with attended invited events or interacting with youth within the community. Members are frequently visiting local schools or just stopping to chat with residents in the community. Grimshaw detachment was open the 1st and 3rd Wednesdays of each month to help build on providing services to residents on the western boarder of the detachment. Community engagement also included Town of Peace River emergency planning meetings due to river break up preparedness. Peace River Detachment was visible and participated in River Days that was held at River Front Park in Peace River. Members interacted with the public in a positive way and ensured a safety environment for all attendees. Community Advisory Committee has been busy this quarter with speed boards posted throughout the region to help ensure road safety in the region. Also have been working collectively as a group to bring awareness to Rural Crime Watch and Crime Stoppers within the region. Mental Health Task Force has worked collaboratively together to help advocate for mental health supports in the region.

Priority #4: Traffic - Impaired Driving

Updates and Comments:

This quarter Peace River members have been out issuing violation tickets which have lead to impaired (IRS) operation investigations. My issuing tickets and conducting MAS (mandatory alcohol screening) roads in our area will be safer for everyone. Traffic continues to be a focus as it can often times lead to other Criminal Code investigations.

Re: Request for funding for independent public education on nuclear development, and for written reasons should the request be declined

Dear Members of the Peace Regional Energy Alliance:

We write regarding the Alliance's Position Paper of July 2026, *Building a Social License for Nuclear Energy Development in Northwestern Alberta* in which you made a statement to a "strong commitment to continued education, conversation, dialogue and engagement with the communities and residents" and in which you assured communities will be "engaged early and meaningfully throughout the process." Residents in the plebiscites held with the October 2025 declined support for the project but required the CNL and the municipality to "explore the potential impacts" of a nuclear plant and "engaging the residents" on this.

No "potential impacts" have been published to the residents by PREA, and the residents have not been engaged or consulted by PREA.

PREA and the County of Northern Lights spent more than \$14,000 in public funds on the presentations by Dr. Neil Alexander, a pro-nuclear activist that advocated and influenced the residents for the nuclear industry. Alexander was promoted to the residents as a nuclear expert with a PhD in nuclear science, but this turned out to be a false misrepresentation. When Alexander's presentation slide was also exposed as disinformation, PREA hastily appointed a new PREA spokesperson and communications lead, Mr. Jake Pastore, who writes social licenses for the nuclear industry to whomever pays him. Pastore's Position Paper misled the public to believe nuclear electricity is "reliable", "affordable", "zero-emission". "economic stability" and "sustainable". This is even worse disinformation than the disinformation spread by Dr. Alexander. PREA spokesperson and communications lead, Mr. Jake Pastore, is not responding to emails and he advised he is seeking new instructions from PREA. Large sums of public funds were also wasted on Pastore.

The other consultant, Arcadis, was interviewed *in camera*. The only reasonable purpose of such an in-camera interview was to conceal from the residents the real purpose PREA had for its consultants.

The role Arcadis proposed was to act as an independent third-party to help municipalities with responses, to collect community concerns and as an independent third party to protect the public interest. Chair Ungarian reported he "spoke with representatives from Arcadis but felt that their services were not what PREC required" — he required the type of services of Alexander and Pastore, who were clearly not appointed to protect the public interest.

It is clear that PREA and its predecessor PREC spend public funds on one-sided pro-nuclear advocacy and activism for the purpose to promote Energy Alberta's nuclear project for them. Public funds should not be committed **only** to consultants whose conclusions support PREA's agenda.

A body committed to evidence-based information and to informed communities should be prepared to fund credible voices on both sides of the question. PREA has not "*explored the potential impacts*" of a nuclear plant or "*engaged the residents*". The residents are still being denied a genuine opportunity to hear both sides.

It is for these reasons that we requested funding for Dr. M.V. Ramana — a world renowned physicist and professor at the University of British Columbia who is a widely published authority on nuclear energy, disarmament and global security — to travel to the region in the first week of October 2026 to present to local communities on the risks and implications of nuclear development.

Our previous request was declined by both PREA and CNL and we now are renewing this request.

We ask that PREA provide financial assistance, up to the amount expended on Dr. Alexander and Pastore, to bring Dr. Ramana and other independent speakers to our communities, so that residents may weigh the risks alongside the projected benefits and that the residents can reach informed conclusions.

Should PREA decline this financial request, we ask that PREA provide its reasons for its decision in writing.

We look forward to your response.
