The 2017-2018 school year is the 20th consecutive year of Safety Smarts delivery to children attending rural and remote elementary schools across our province. Concurrent Session Presenter Mara Casey Tieken is an associate professor of education at Bates College in Lewiston, Maine. Her research focuses on racial and educational equity in rural schools and communities. Her book Why rural schools matter (University of North Carolina Press, 2014), anethnographic study of two rural southern communities, examines how rural schools define and sustain their surrounding communities. She is currently working on a multi-year project, supported by a grant from the Spencer Foundation, that explores the college aspirations, transitions, and persistence of rural, first-generation students. Mara also studies community organizing for education reform and works with the Annenberg Institute for School Reform, where she supports organizing efforts in rural New England. Mara is the 2016 recipient of the Lynton Award for the Scholarship of Engagement for Early Career Faculty. Before receiving her doctorate from the Harvard Graduate School of Education, Mara taught elementary school in rural Tennessee.

Dr. Hobart L. Harmon

Concurrent Session Presenter In joining VASS, Dr. Harmon brings extensive experience as an independent consultant in educational planning, research and evaluation. He is one of the nation's leading experts on public education in rural America. Dr. Harmon held an adjunct Associate Professor of Education (Educational Leadership) appointment in the Department of Education Policy Studies at Penn State University, where he affiliated with the Center on Rural Education and Communities.

Dr. Michael Corbett

Concurrent Session Presenter Michael Corbett works in the School of Education at Acadia University. From 2015-to the beginning of 2018 he served as Professor or Rural and Regional Education at the University of Tasmania. Corbett has studied of rural outmigration, youth educational decision-making, the politics of educational assessment, literacies in rural contexts, improvisation and the arts in education, the position of rural Identities and experiencen in education, conceptions of space, place and mobilities, the viability of small rural schools, "wicked" policy problems and controversies in education, and the use of film and video as a literate medium in schools. He has published widely for academic audiences contributing more than 200 books, scholarly articles, reviews, book chapters, reports, conference presentations and invited addresses. Corbett works both with rural communities and schools in Australia and Canada as well as doing international comparative work.

Dr. Kal Schafft

Concurrent Session Presenter Dr. Schafft is an Associate Professor of Education at The Pennsylvania State University based within the Educational Leadership Program. Dr. Schafft directs the College's Center for Rural Education and Communities and serves as associate editor for the Journal of Research in Rural Education, He comes to Penn State from Cornell University where he received his Ph.D. in Development Sociology in 2003. His research interests broadly concern the relationship between social inequality, spatial inequality and rural development. His recent work examines the school and community impacts of unconventional gas development within Pennsylvania's Marcellus Shale play. Dr. Schafft has also conducted research on rural poverty, student transiency, the determinants of rural childhood obesity, youth aspirations and rural brain drain, and the role of schools in rural community development. During the spring of 2016 Dr. Schafft was a visiting fellow at Central European University's Institute for Advanced Studies in Budapest, Hungary where he conducted research on the social and political implications of Hungary's nationality self-government system for Hungary's Roma minority.

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

Thank you for attending the County of Northern Lights Council meeting on December 13, 2017, and for presenting your concerns and information regarding the closure of the Autumn Lodge in Berwyn. While Council has been kept very well informed on this matter by our appointed board member Mr. Brent Reese they appreciated hearing directly from you regarding the concerns.

As discussed at the meeting, the independent review of the decision-making process was undertaken as requested. County Council feels that we need to trust this process as well as the ability of the board of NPHF to make decisions that benefit seniors in the long term, for the entire area that the organization serves. The board has expressed regret for the breakdown in communications as well as any hardship that has caused, and is working with the Minister of Seniors and Housing to address concerns raised by lodge residents, and your group.

Once a year each Council has an opportunity to elect a representative to the board of NPHF and at that time Council is obligated to act if a change is required. Outside of that, Council does not, and should not provide direction to our board member or the organization itself. To do so would undermine the authority of the board as granted by the provincial government.

The Governments of Alberta and Canada are currently negotiating this Phase 2 bilateral agreement, expected to be signed in March 2018. Alberta's allocation is \$3.4 billion for: Public Transit, Green Infrastructure, Community, Culture and Recreation and Rural and Northern Communities.

PUBLIC TRANSIT

Helping Canadian communities to improve and expand their existing public transif-systems.

COMMUNITY, CULTURE AND RECREATION

Funding will support new, expanded or renewed community centres and hubs, amateur sport, cultural and recreational installations and facilities.

\$3.4B

RURAL AND NORTHERN COMMUNITIES

Funding will support projects that improve food security, local road or air infrastructure, broadband connectivity, efficient and reliable energy sources.

GREEN INFRASTRUCTURE

Consists of three separate sub-streams Greenhouse Gas Mitigation; Adaptation; Resilience and Disaster Mitigation; and Environmental Quality.

Cost Sharing

The federal government will provide cost-sharing for eligible projects up to the following:



- Provincial: maximum of 50 per cent for each project;
- Municipal: maximum of 40 per cent for each project. Provinces are required to cost-share on municipal projects at a minimum of 33.33 per cent of eligible costs;
- Not-for-profit sector: maximum of 40 per cent for each project;
- Indigenous communities: maximum of 75 per cent;
- Private sector, for-profit owned: maximum of 25 per cent (not eligible for the Community, Culture and Recreation stream);
- Under the Rural and Northern Communities stream, Canada will invest up to 50 per cent for provincial, municipal and not-for-profit projects.

Next Steps on the Agreement

Alberta is responsible for identifying and submitting projects to the federal government, who will then determine approval. Alberta will work with municipalities and other partners to determine eligible projects to be submitted.



Projects will be prioritized based on the fiscal situation and provincial priorities and will be submitted after the agreement is signed in 2018.

Interested municipalities are encouraged to work with applicable Ministries to identify and prioritize projects.

The Canada Infrastructure Bank



The Canada Infrastructure Bank is a new tool that provincial, territorial, municipal and Indigenous government partners can use to access innovative financing for revenue-generating infrastructure projects. It aims to attract private and institutional investment to such projects in Canada, which will help public dollars go further by leveraging the capital and expertise of the private sector.

The Bank will invest \$35 billion from the federal government towards revenue-generating infrastructure projects that are in the public interest, with a focus on projects such as public transit systems, trade and transportation corridors, and green infrastructure.



- Significant flood or fire
- Hazardous Materials Incident
- Activation of a municipal Reception Center due to a significant incident
